The Day Everything Is Made New

SESSION FOCUS

The Bible ends with a promise:
God will make all things new.

In this final session, we explore how that promised future reshapes how we live **right now**—not by escaping the world, but by faithfully engaging it with hope, perseverance, and trust.

OPENING REFLECTION

Take a moment to reflect.

- When you imagine the future God promises, what do you feel?
- Does hope energize you—or make you disengage?

SCRIPTURE READING

Read **Revelation 21:1–5** slowly.

Notice:

- What God does
 - Where God dwells
 - What is removed and what is renewed
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KEY IDEA

The future God promises
shapes the life we live now.

PART 1: GOD MAKES ALL THINGS NEW

(Revelation 21:1–5)

- What kind of future is God describing?
- How is this renewal—not escape?

PART 2: HOPE WITHOUT ESCAPE

(John 17:14–18)

Reflection Questions

- Why does Jesus pray for presence rather than removal?
- Where are you tempted to withdraw?

(Luke 19:11–13)

Reflection Questions

- How does Jesus describe waiting?
- Why does faithfulness matter until He returns?

PART 4: LIVING AS NEW-CREATION PEOPLE NOW

(Romans 8:18–25)

Reflection Questions

- What does hope demand of us in the present?
- How does future restoration give meaning to today?

- Where is God calling you to remain fully engaged?



- How can future hope shape your daily faithfulness?

CLOSING PRAYER

Ask God for hope that endures and faithfulness that lasts.

OPTIONAL PRACTICE FOR THE WEEK

- Read **Revelation 21:1–5** each day
 - Ask: *“How can I live today like this is true?”*
 - Commit one act of renewed faithfulness
